Review: The Core Principle

Authentic Integration

- How can you be a better digital literacy role model in the classroom?





BaamBoozle:


- Make your <u>own games</u> or use someone else's games.
- Students enjoy the competition
- Students help each other answer making learning a collective exercise
- If you use a Vibe/presentation board students learn presentation skills
 - Point and click by hand/stylus
 - Public speaking





Google Classroom

- Teaches personal responsibility
 - Time management skills
 - Project management skills
- Incorporates Google Drive, BookWidgets, and other EdTech
- Students can see grades and redo work as you grade.

Ventures Arcade

- You can use this even without a subscription to their books.
- It has a small library but it's great for point and click practice and basic mouse skills activities.
- There are also free Kahoots!
 Games to get your students
 talking and answering questions
 on their own. (Unlike
 Baamboozle where it's a team
 game.)
- It includes interactive activities for all 10 of their course units.



Padlet

- I don't use this, but I've heard that many teachers do.
- Creating posts
- Collaborative posting
- Tagging and naming items
- Uploading media





For Teachers: Digital Promise

- Adult Learner Factors:

- Strategies:
 - Activity ideas with a list of factors they fulfill
- Saves you time from brainstorming ideas.
 - You don't need to reinvent the wheel.

Hover to see how factors connect to Hearing. Then click connected factors to explore strategies related to multiple factors.




Mindfulness Activities

Creating patterns through mnemonic devices, such as acronyms, categorizing items, visual images, or rhyming,...


Multiple Methods of Assessment

Bonus: Section 3: Al in the beginner ESOL Classroom

Let's look at the next frontier of authentic, accessible tools: using Al as a practice partner.

First Literacy Professional Development Workshop

Al can be a great learning tool. Teachers need to stop being afraid of:

- Students cheating
- Al diminishing critical thinking
- Atrophy and over reliance
- Misinformation or hallucinations





Activity for 0 to below level 1 students

Start on paper with prompts. Ex: "What did you do on Saturday?"

Students write sentences in the past-tense.

Then One at a time upload them to Gemini, DeepSeek, etc.

Prompt:

"You are a patient ESOL 101 tutor. I will give you a sentence. Your job is to check the verb tense and correct any grammar errors. Your response MUST always follow these two rules:

First, correct my sentence in English.

Second, Explain the corrections in _____ (native language)."

Follow the steps in the next three slides



Adapt your teaching to use AI as an enhancement to learning.

Setup:

The teacher uses questions about what they did on _____ (past days) to prompt sentences.

The students, who are struggling with past tense verbs, write their answers in full sentences.

Ask AI to breakdown the sentence

Use the prompt on the previous screen.



Adapt your teaching to use AI as an enhancement to learning.

Edit/Correction:

Second, AI explains the corrections in _____ (native language) helping students understand the "why" better.


Fix sentences as a class:

Teacher uses some of the students' original sentences and goes over the corrections with the class.

Students make the corrections based on what they learned.

Teacher adds new incorrect sentences to the board/slides.

Students correct these new sentences to show understanding.



Adapt your teaching to use AI as an enhancement to learning.

Reflect - Students:

What was hard?

What was easy?

What did you learn?

Did this activity help?

Reflect - Teacher:

Were the questions easy to understand?

What parts of the activity were difficult and need rethinking?

What are the opportunities to improve this activity?



What do the students get from this activity?

- Changes AI from a cheat to a personalized analytical tutor.
- Students learn to analyze their writing improving metacognition
