Why are we learning phonics?



Phonics: Letter Sounds

Phonics - sounding out CVC words

CVC words have a **Consonant**, a **Vowel**, and a **Consonant**: like **sat, cat, hat**

First, make each letter sound, then **blend** them together.



Phonics - sounding out CVC words

CVC words have a Consonant, a Vowel, and a Consonant: like **sat**, **cat**, **hat**

After they learn letter sounds, children can sound out CVC words. First, make each letter sound, then **blend** them together.




Phonics: Digraphs

- **CH** - March, child, lunch, chat
- **SH** - shave, wash, shorts, fish
- **Soft TH** - think, bath, thank, both
- **Hard TH** - mother, father, that, there
- **TCH (CH sound)** - watch, stretch, itch, match
- **WH** - what, when, why, whisper
- **CK** - kick, sock, flick, luck
- **PH (F sound)** - phone, phonics, photograph

Phonics: Magic E

When a word has a vowel, then a consonant, then an “e” at the end:

- The vowel says its name and the e is silent.
 - at, mat, pin, not - *short vowel sound*
 - ate, mate, pine, note - *long vowel sound (the e is silent)*





Phonics: Diphthongs

A combination of two vowels when the sound begins as one vowel and changes to another vowel.



DIPHTHONGS

A diphthong is two vowels that work together to make a new vowel sound.

Phonics: Diphthongs

- **aw:** draw, saw, crawl, law, hawk
- **au:** audio, pause, fault, author, cause
- **ew:** chew, few, cashew, drew, stew
- **oo:** zoo, shampoo, soon, food, bamboo
- **ue:** blue, true, glue, clue, avenue
- **oi:** point, coin, boil, noise, oil
- **oy:** boy, joy, enjoy, oyster, toy
- **ow:** how, cow, flower, down, growl
- **ou:** loud, house, couch, round, cloud

○ ≠ oo irregular vowel team: book, cook, cookie, shook

■ *Similar to u sound in push or bush*

Why is English spelling so difficult?

- English is a mix of many different languages.
- The spelling is difficult because today's English comes from many languages, and the pronunciation changes over time, but the spelling does not.

For example:

- knife
- daughter



Phonics: Sight Words

- Because English spelling is so weird, not all words can be sounded out using phonics.
- In each grade, children are taught “sight words” to memorize (know without having to sound out the word).
- Examples of sight words:


- two
- where
- you
- is
- and
- the
- some
- were
- *so many more!*

As your child is learning sight words, they will use invented spelling while writing. That's okay! It is important practice with sounds!

- is - *child writes iz*
- some - *child writes sum*

Phonics: Sight Words

- Teachers sometimes give children lists of sight words to practice.
- Flash cards and games are useful if your child has trouble with sight words! Free [lists of sight words](#) can be found online, too.



Your child's Early Writing Skills: Invented Spelling


Mi dg is blk. He is fz.

I lv hm. His nam is Ots.

My dog is black. He is fuzzy.


I love him. His name is Otis.

Don't worry if your child's writing is like this when they start writing (and when they are spelling new words)!



Invented Spelling = Important skill while learning to write!

- Encourage your child to sound out words instead of telling them how to spell the word.
 - *Child*: “How do you spell cat?”
 - *Adult*: “Let’s sound it out. Cat. /C/ /A/ /T/. What do you hear?”
 - *Child writes*: KT
- It’s okay if you can’t read their invented spelling, your child is learning phonics very well! Ask them to read the writing to you.



Phonics: Silent Letters



What do you notice about the silent letters?

What letters are near them? Where are they in the words?

You don't say the silent letter:

- **W:** wrap, wrong, write, wrist, answer
- **H:** hour, honest, herb, honor, ghost
- **B:** bomb, lamb, thumb, limb
- **K:** know, knife, knot, knee
- **G:** sign, feign, align, gnat
- **GH:** right, eight, taught, daughter, fight

There are many more silent letters in English!

Phonics: Bossy R

- When the letter R follows a vowel, the R changes the sound of the vowel. That's why we call it the "Bossy R." (Sometimes called an "R Controlled Vowel.")
- Look at the following words, and notice how the vowel sound changes when the R is added.

hen	her
sit	sir
fox	for
fun	fur

Phonics: “Bossy R” or R Controlled Vowels

- ar: car, start, park, star, art
- or: horn, born, forget, fork, doctor, actor
- er: her, sister, brother, lottery, server
- ir: bird, shirt, first, birthday, thirty
- ur: burn, church, Thursday, purse, turn



Phonics: Glued/Welded Sounds

- Glued or welded sounds are groups of letters that often appear together in words. The sounds are difficult to separate (and don't always sound how you expect).
- Usually, children are taught these groups of letters in 1st grade.
- Children are taught to think of these letters as glued or stuck together.






Phonics: Glued/Welded Sounds

- all: **ball**, **call**, **install**, **fall**
- am: **ham**, **swam**, **slam**, **yam**
- an: **fan**, **man**, **than**, **plan**




Phonics: Glued/Welded Sounds

- ang: fang, hang, rang, sang
- ing: ring, thing, bring, sing
- ong: song, belong, wrong, long
- ung: lung, sung, hung, clung



Phonics: More Glued/Welded Sounds

- ank: **bank**, **thank**, **blank**, **rank**
- ink: **pink**, **drink**, **stink**, **sink**
- onk: **honk**, **bonk**
- unk: **junk**, **trunk**, **drunk**, **stunk**



Phonics: Consonant Blends

- Children in school practice blending separate letter sounds into words (like we did with CVC words like **cat**). This helps them read and write.
- Children also practice blending consonant sounds when they are next to each other. They practice groups of words that have the same consonant blends.

Phonics: Common Beginning Consonant Blends

- **bl:** blueberries, **blocks**, **blood**
- **cl:** **clock**, **clown**, **closet**
- **fl:** **fly**, **flamingo**, **flew**
- **gl:** **globe**, **gloves**, **glue**
- **pl:** **plum**, **plug**, **please**
- **sl:** **sled**, **slide**, **sleep**
- **br:** **brick**, **broom**, **bring**
- **cr:** **crab**, **crayon**, **crazy**
- **dr:** **dress**, **drum**, **drink**
- **fr:** **frog**, **fruit**, **free**


